(Empirical Correction of Seven Myths About Schizophrenia with Implications for Treatment)

Myth: "Once a schizophrenic always a schizophrenic.

Evidence: Studies have consistently found that half to two thirds of patients significantly improved or recovered, including some cohorts of very chronic cases."

Myth: "Patients must be on medication all their lives.

Reality: There are no data existing which support this myth."
